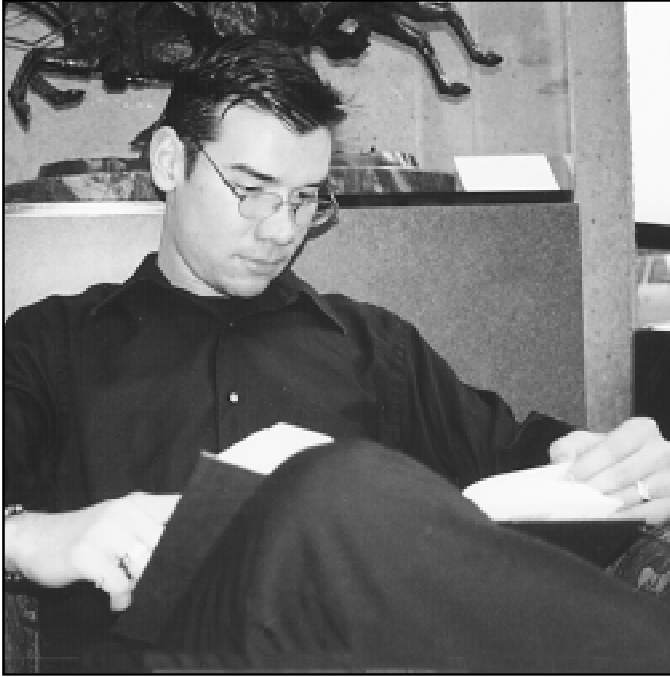


Read a Good Book
