Daniel Yankelovich to Keynote in Riverside

Daniel Yankelovich will be the keynote speaker and guest of honor at the CSA annual meeting in Riverside, November 7, 2008.

Dan is the pre-eminent pollster and public-opinion analyst of our time. He is associated with UCSD's Foundation and its Division of Social Sciences. He recently endowed the Daniel Yankelovich Chair in Social Thought in the Sociology Department at UC San Diego.

After attending Boston Latin School, Dan graduated from Harvard University in 1946 and 1950 before completing postgraduate studies at the Sorbonne in France. He taught psychology at New York University and the New School for Social Research.

In 1958 he founded the marketing and research firm Daniel Yankelovich, Inc., which later was renamed as Yankelovich, Skelly, & White, Inc., remaining chair until 1986. He also founded The New York Times/Yankelovich Poll, now The New York Times/CBS Poll. In 1976, he founded Public Agenda, a nonpartisan group devoted to public opinion and citizen education. In 1996 he served as Senior Fellow at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard.

His books include:

Coming to Public Judgment: Making Democracy Work in a Complex World,
The Magic of Dialogue: Transforming Conflict into Cooperation,
Profit With Honor: The New Stage of Market Capitalism,
How Societies Learn, and
Uniting America: Restoring the Vital Center to American Democracy.

Dan is the recipient of The Parlin Award for his pioneering work in marketing research, the Dinerman Award of the World Association of Public Opinion Research, and the Outstanding Achievement Award from the New York Chapter of the American Association of Public Opinion Research.

Dan has served on the boards of many corporations and foundations including CBS, US West, the Kettering Foundation, the Japan Society, the Educational Testing Service, and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Education. He is Chair of the Advisory Board of the Future of American Democracy Foundation, a nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation "dedicated to research and education aimed at renewing and sustaining the historic vision of American democracy."
